

YOUR VOTING RIGHTS IN FLORIDA

- **Voter ID. BRING ID.** You must bring a valid photo ID with signature to vote. If your photo ID does not contain your signature, you will be asked to present another form of ID with your signature. If you registered to vote by mail and have not previously voted in a federal election, you must show current and valid photo identification or a copy of a current utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck or other government document that shows your name and address. You have the right to vote with a provisional ballot if you cannot present a valid ID.
- **Change of residence.** If you move to another election precinct in the same county prior to an election and you did not apply for a change of residence, you have the right to vote by regular ballot in your new election precinct if you provide a signed affirmation confirming both your former address and your new address. If you are moving to another county, you must register if you want to vote in your new county of residence. However, you may apply to cast an absentee ballot in your former county in elections for president, U.S. Senate, statewide offices and questions of statewide issues.
- **Clothing, buttons, caps and other accessories.** Rule 1S-2.034, Florida Administrative Code, specifically states “voters may wear campaign buttons, shirts, hats, or any other campaign items when they enter the polling place to vote; voters may not otherwise campaign there.”
- **No-electioneering perimeter.** No electioneering is allowed within 100 feet of the polling place.
